
I want to leave you with two more sentences from my episcopal address:

The 2024 Workers' Compensation invoices were recently mailed to churches. The invoices were delayed due to implementing a new online payment system. We are seeking churches willing to test the online payment system for us. If you would like to pay your church's workers' compensation invoice online, please reach out to Bethany White, bwhite@eccenter.com, for login credentials and instructions. Currently only credit card payments are accepted. We hope to have an ACH option available soon. There is no requirement to pay invoices electronically, although it is encouraged. All future benefit invoices will have an online payment option. The disability and benefit corporation service fee will have an online payment option available in early 2025. Health insurance invoices will have a later implementation date.

A few churches are paying their health insurance premiums via an ACH transfer. That ACH transfer for health insurance will continue. If your church would like to pay its monthly health insurance premium via an ACH transfer, please reach out to Kevin Henry, khenry@eccenter.com, for information.

Payments for the Disability and Benefit Corp Services fees were due January 15 and April 15, respectively; both fees are listed on the 2024 Treasurer's Guide available on www.members.eccenter.com.

An email was distributed on Wednesday, June 19, 2024, explaining the impact on EC Churches of the new minimum salary requirement to be exempted from overtime wages. Free Money Is Going Fast -

We have once again partnered with the National Association of Evangelicals (NAE) to offer Pastoral Financial Health and Church Generosity training. To encourage participation in the financial health training, a grant of \$10,000 was originally gifted with \$6,000 awarded to thirteen EC pastors, leaving \$4,000 available for additional grants. The training is open to all paid pastoral or ministerial individuals employed by an EC Church. The pastor/minister may be full time or part time (no minimum hours); serve as the lead, senior, associate, assistant or youth pastor; in outreach or in a music ministry. All of these positions are eligible to participate in the training and receive a cash gift. If you have completed the financial health training previously (2019 - 2021), you are not eligible to receive a second cash gift. The offer of a cash gift expires on December 31, 2024. The cash gifts are made available by the generosity, vision, and ministry of the Lilly Endowment in partnership with the NAE.

To receive a \$250 cash gift, a pastor must complete one of the Pastoral Financial Health modules at <https://naefinancialhealth.online/>. Scroll down the page and select "Create Account." On the next page, enter your information and from the drop-down box of participating denominations, select us, Evangelical Congregational Church. On the next page, select one module from the six session Personal Finances Course. Once the module is completed, I will receive an email that the class was completed and send the registered participant the financial gift.

A second \$250 grant will be awarded for the completion of a second module in the Personal Financial Health course. A maximum of \$500 in grants will be awarded per participant. Each training can be completed in 60 to 90 minutes, and these grants are tax-free.

The \$250 grant is also available to a pastor that completes the Church Generosity training with their church leadership. The pastor and church leadership are required to complete the Church Generosity class together. The grant for completing the training is only available for the pastor and will be paid to the pastor. The maximum cash award is \$500 per pastor, and a combination of completed training between the personal financial course and the Church Generosity training is allowed.

Healthy Pastors Help Build Healthy Churches

You may be familiar with surveys suggesting that up to 42% of pastors have considered quitting full-time ministry during the prior year. The research, published April 27, 2022 by [Barna.com](https://www.barna.com), reveals that “over half of pastors who have considered quitting full-time ministry (56%), say ‘the immense stress of the job’ has factored into their thoughts on leaving. Beyond these general stressors, two in five pastors (43%) say, ‘I feel lonely and isolated,’ while 38 percent name ‘current political divisions’ as reasons they have considered stepping away.” It seems unlikely that landscape will improve in 2024.

Even pastors and church leaders who have not seriously contemplated quitting recently can bear the scars of ministry. As Barna states, “stress, isolation and division are impacting these church leaders’ ability to lead.” The effort and emotional investment required to faithfully lead a church can bring about exhaustion and discouragement as well as stress on pastors’ marriages and families. Thankfully, there are helpful resources available. The Church Health Community is excited to recommend ServingLeaders Ministries as a trusted resource for pastoral counseling and health.

The purpose of ServingLeaders is to “revive, restore and resource ministry leaders and their families, enabling them to pursue health and excellence in their call to ministry.” ([ServingLeaders.org](https://www.servingleaders.org))

As the ServingLeaders website explains, “Ministry leaders play a very strategic role in the life, health and growth of the local and worldwide church. They exercise tremendous responsibility, exert powerful influence in their communities, and can have a profound impact on culture. The health of a ministry or congregation is directly affected by the health of its leaders. But who cares for ministry leaders and their families? There are precious few safe places to address problems confidentially without criticism or judgment.” Services they provide include: individual, marriage and family counseling; seminars; ministry coaching and consulting; conflict resolution and free or low-cost retreats. Most services, including counseling, are available via Zoom so it is not necessary to travel to their offices in West Chester and Willow Grove, PA.

It is very encouraging that we have made a growing number of referrals for counseling. Pastors in the Evangelical Congregational Church are eligible for up to six paid-for counseling visits. 

At this past National Conference, we all had the privilege of hearing Izabella McMillon, a child who received an Operation Christmas Child shoebox, tell her story. We were all moved to tears as she shared the powerful story of how her life was dramatically changed for Christ through the power of a simple shoebox gift.

Since then, many of you asked us how Izabella ended up in the United States, so we contacted her and asked her to share the rest of her story with us. The story that follows is the rest of her story in her own words.



Izabella grew up during the communistic regime in Romania when no church was allowed to share the salvation message. Even going to church could have resulted in death. Having found a hidden Bible in the floor board of their home, Izabella and her brother were filled with curiosity. They secretly attended a church on Saturday nights and eventually trusted that the Bible was in fact, God's Word. However, Izabella describes her faith at that time as having vague head knowledge of Christ but no heart understanding. When she was 13 years old, Izabella received a shoebox gift in the streets of Romania. When she opened it, she couldn't believe her eyes. She had a very specific answer to a very specific prayer. For Izabella, the shoebox was life changing, because it allowed her to experience for the first time God's unconditional love and His existence. She finally understood that this God that she was reading about in the Bible was a truly personal God who cares about each and every person. That day, God made His way from Izabella's intellectual understanding of who He is, to her heart.

Izabella came to the United States in 2002, after finishing college in Romania. She had the privilege to attend Seminary in post-communist Romania and had a strong passion to share Jesus with others while in pursuit of learning the English language. She arrived on US soil in August of 2002, and two years later learned about the ministry of Operation Christmas Child through a small Christian School in NC where she was teaching. She was excited to learn the name of the ministry that played a major role in her understanding God's true character. In 2004 Izabella introduced the project at Gorman Christian Academy in Durham, NC, where she taught for 10 years. This small Christian school of 100 students packed over 1800 shoeboxes in 2013, and still continues to pack today. In June 2014 Izabella came completely full circle within the ministry, as she started serving full time with Operation Christmas Child, leading the Speakers Bureau. Today, packing shoeboxes is a yearly family tradition for Izabella, her husband Joel and her children Kaleb and Naomi Joy. Izabella also takes every opportunity to tell others about the life changing potential each shoebox has and encourages audiences all across the US to get involved in what God is doing around the world with Operation Christmas Child.

We pray that all of us will be challenged to pack more shoeboxes this year and reach more children for Christ after hearing Izabella's story.

Izabella's story that she shared at National Conference is posted on our denominational YouTube channel (<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=HDnvEtGWxzl>). We encourage you to show it to your congregation or your missions' group and pray that it will greatly inspire and encourage them to pack more boxes. Each box represents one more child who will hear about Jesus and have an opportunity to have their lives changed by Christ. Join with us in a dynamic movement of God as we reach the lost with passion through a simple shoebox gift.

Discipleship Multiplication Cohorts

During the Kingdom Extension Community report at last month's National Conference, I talked about discipleship multiplication cohorts that would begin this fall. This article will explain the purpose, function and details of those cohorts so you can make an informed decision for you and your church.

Who should consider a Discipleship Cohort? Any pastor or church who is frustrated with the attractational model of ministry; any pastor or church who wants to clarify the process of disciple-making; any pastor or church who would like to work with a team of like-minded church leaders to help churches fulfill the Great Commission; or any pastor or church who wants to connect with an accountability circle to follow through with discipleship multiplication should consider a discipleship cohort.

Why Cohorts? Most of us have been to conferences, retreats or presentations that struck a chord in our hearts. What was being presented rung true inside, resonating with us that we needed to go that direction. Then when we walked away from the event, and nothing really changes. The idea of a cohort is to both learn the concept of a discipleship pathway and then walk with a group to develop a plan, holding each other accountable to application and follow-through. The cohort will help put feet to the plan.

What is a Pathway? Every pastor and most followers of Christ could recognize and defend the importance of making disciples, even making disciples who make disciples. The difficulty most churches run into is having a solid plan to follow that can be easily replicated in each consecutive generation of Jesus followers. At a cohort, we will develop a discipleship pathway unique to your context that can help individuals walk through being a disciple that has the tools to make disciples who make disciples.

What is involved in a Cohort? Cohorts will begin with a two-hour training Zoom call in September followed by monthly check-ins with your cohort. Each Zoom call will involve next steps in the Pathway development process and implementation, as well as reporting in and accountability on past action steps. The end goal is to become churches who are actually reproducing disciples.

For our prayer focus in July, we want to look to one of our newest pastors who was just licensed at our last National Conference. We praise the Lord for raising up workers!

Evan Clelan was credentialed as a licensed candidate. Although not currently pastoring a church, he is presently appointed by the Lebanon VA Medical Center as a clinical pastoral education resident. As such, he has a number of duties in the chaplaincy department, including visiting and counseling with patients and staff, attending the treatment team meetings as chaplaincy staff member, writing reflections on his patient visits, doing spiritual assessments on new admissions, conducting Sunday services along with various other groups, conducting funerals if necessary and ministering in any way possible to the patients while sharing hope and Christ with them as they walk through their illnesses.

Evan's goal is to complete the CPE residency program this summer and then enter the military after that as a chaplain. Evan has previously served in the Marines and feels a call to go back into the military to minister to those who are serving their country. the EC Church's Chaplaincy Committee and the EC Church's Ministerial Development Committee to complete all requirements for ordination and service in the US Navy. Evan is married to Megan, an ex-Marine, and also has five children: Abiageal, Grace, Elias, Emmitt and Joshua.


